ACTIVITY REPORT OF THE GVJCCA HUMAN RIGHTS COMMITTEE BETWEEN NOVEMBER 2011 AND SEPTEMBER 2012

Members:

Our members are Tatsuo Kage, Mary Kitagawa, Tosh Kitagawa, Morgan Elander, Ron Nishimura, Lorene Oikawa, Lily Shinde, Vivian Rygnestad, Agustina Santosa, Leslie Komori, Judy Hanazawa. Vivian joined our committee in April, 2012. We have been greatly assisted this year by support from our student administrative staff Tomoko McGaughey and Colin Brown. Tomoko and Morgan Elander were also student assistants in 2011. Fortunately for the Human Rights Committee, Morgan has moved on to join our committee as well as the GVJCCA board. Tomoko is also continuing to assist the GVJCCA. We hope Colin can continue to participate with the committee also. We thank and appreciate the support received from them all.

September 2011:

- HOP book project ongoing chapter editing work
- DVD's of HOP Story tellers to be produced for them
- Press conference/media coverage to be organized to advocate for degree granting for 1942 Japanese Canadian UBC students
- Hastings Park project timeline planned as:
 - Internment plaque relocation now
 - Mounting identifying interpretive outside signage on all detention buildings – through 2012
 - Developing and setting indoor interpretive centre presentation in Livestock building – 2013-2014
 - Participating in redevelopment of Momiji Garden and Japanese gateway – after 2014
- Tatsuo produced the Japanese translation of the NAJC Human Rights Committee WEB Human Rights Guide.

October:

- UBC notified Mary Kitagawa they are planning a special honouring for 1942 students. Petition campaign underway. Mary covered on CBC
- Hastings park field trip October 23
- HOP DVD's are being reproduced for distribution with cases, covers, etc. Mailout list to be organized. Work session to set up DVD package set for November meeting
- HRC decided to pay membership to the BC Human Rights Coalition

November:

- UBC has agreed to grant JC 1942 students honorary degrees. Mary and Tosh will participate with special committee at UBC in planning the event
- Tosh Kitagawa will participate on NAJC Human Rights Committee and take Tatsuo's place as Tatsuo has resigned
- Hastings Park Project Committee planning to meet with PNE Board to seek their endorsement and funding support
- HOP Book project requires deadline planning for completion of all chapter drafts. Deadline planned for January21, 2012
- DVD production and distribution work meeting set for January, 2011.

December:

- Detailed planning for the special degree honouring ceremony and reception underway. Mary and Tosh are being consulted regarding all aspects of the event. Planning is proceeding successfully. Current focus is on finding all surviving students, and families of students
- HOP book project ongoing;
- DVD mail-out for story tellers: covering letter to compose and addresses to confirm and DVD's to be prepared for mailing
- Hastings Park Project: Contact to meet with PNE board unsuccessful so will attempt in January, 2012
- Referral from John Price re researching incidents of Canadian wartime military abuse of Korean civilians
- Nomination of Tatsuo Kage for Gordon Hirabayashi NAJC human rights award

2012 January:

- DVD's ready for envelopes and covering letter for Story Tellers
- HOP chapters need photos of each story teller as well as historic photos. Tatsuo can ask Eileen Kage to provide HOP story teller head shot photos from DVD footage as Eileen assisted in producing the DVD
- Hastings Park meeting with planner Dave Hutch. Referral for project support to be made also to the Hastings Park Steering Committee. Names of detainees are being documented and families from across Canada are submitting detainee names to GVJCCA. Detainee names will be documented as part of the interpretive presentation in Livestock Building.
- Possibility of hosting a presentation by John Price and lawyer representing Korean victim family regarding Canadian military abuse of civilians during Korean War to advocate for seeking compensation
- Lorene Oikawa is reviewing incidents on internet, twitter, etc. of casual use of derogatory racist terms.

February:

- HOP Book Project nearing completion. Judy is covering Tashme stories as well as so called self supporting projects. Mary completed her chapter. Lemon Creek stories need reviewing. New deadline for completion is March 24, 2012
- DVD production: committee members are responsible to distribute DVD's to their colour group story tellers. Cover letter produced for March 24, 2012
- Committee members attended Hastings Park Redevelopment open house on February 22. Also attended February 23 tour of Hastings Park with Parks Canada Gerry Borden. Decision made for relocation of Internment plaque to stone wall area above Momiji Garden to the far left. Costs for relocation to be determined and funding support for relocation will be requested from PNE board and Hastings park steering committee. Grant funding application to be made to NAJC Endowment and other funds. Budget information is required for plaque removal and relocation. Parks Canada can do the plaque refurbishment but cannot move the plaque.



- Mary and Tosh involved with detailed planning and recommending Japanese Canadian guest list for May 30 UBC Convocation Ceremony for 1942 grads.
- Tosh participated in NAJC teleconference. BC Interment marker sites project is being revived possibly developing as a partnered project with First Nations.

March:

- Committee members to attend International Day to eliminate Racism community march on March 18, 2012
- Committee members to attend UBC symposium on March 21, 2012 from 5 to 7 PM to commemorate the International Day to eliminate Racism
- Committee meeting has been rescheduled to March 24, 2012 at 9:30 at the GVJCCA office.
- Tatsuo Kage's book "Uprooted Again: Japanese Canadians Move to Japan after World War II" about the 1946 deportations of Japanese Canadians to Japan to be published. Book launch on May 19, 2012 at Nikkei Centre from 3 to 5PM. Committee is supporting and assisting Tatsuo in organizing his book launch.

April:

- HRC Meeting April 29
- Planning underway to support and assist Tatsuo with launch of his book about Japanese Canadians exiled to Japan "Uprooted Again"
- Eileen Kage will assist in the production of the 2009 HOP conference story circle blue group audiotapes. Story tellers from this group should be given their audiotapes as well as an HOP compilation tape as a keepsake of their conference participation.
- HOP book layout will be produced by John Greenaway. Chapter photos are being chosen by each chapter editor.
- Hastings Park committee is meeting with JB Newall Granite Works to complete cost estimate for relocating the 1989 Parks Canada plaque out of Momiji Garden to a more visible and prominent location in Hastings Park.

May:

 Tatsuo Kage's May 19, 2012 book launch was successful with attendance at over 100 people.



• Note: May 30, 2012 was the date of the UBC Congregation to give degrees to Japanese Canadians who were unable to graduate in 1942. This event took place due to the caring, initiative, hard work, and clear sense of justice of GVJCCA Human Rights Committee member, Mary Kitagawa. Mary was supported by husband Tosh in contacting ex students and their families and preparing for the event. It was exhaustive work but they were relentless in making sure the UBC Congregation was an unforgettable lifetime event which properly recognized and honoured the graduates and their families. Mary Kitagawa's account is being presented to the NAJC 2012 AGM. Resulting from the Congregation, Mary and Tosh continue to work with UBC to launch the Asian Canadian Studies Program which is currently seeking funding for program development support.

June:

- Committee is nominating member Tatsuo Kage for the NAJC Gordon Hirabayashi Award all documentation done by end of June.
- Re Hastings Park project: June 25 HRC members Judy and Lorene presented to the GVJCCA board seeking GVJCCA funding toward the cost of relocating the 1989 Internment plaque.
- Correspondence taking place between committee members and Tosh Suzuki who individually collaborated with the provincial government and Minister Naomi Yamamoto to initiate the May 3 Motion of Apology to Japanese Canadians. We are emphasizing with Tosh that we criticize the province of BC for developing and passing this Motion without communicating, consulting with or involving the Japanese Canadian community.

July:

- Preparation for Powell Street Festival
- Decision made that Mary Kitagawa will draft a letter to the Premier to recommend establishing a public event with the Japanese Canadian community to bring the provincial apology to the Japanese Canadian community;
- GVJCCA Hastings Park Steering Committee (participants are also HRC members) will be meeting with the Hastings Park Redevelopment Steering Committee in August or September to introduce our committee and present our project to them. We are seeking their support for the 1989 Parks Canada plaque relocation as well as funding support toward interpretive signage for each detention building. Committee has also been drafting text for a plaque to be mounted on the Livestock Building, funded through the Vancouver Heritage Foundation 'Places that Matter' project. Also committee



members Tosh Kitagawa and Judy Hanazawa are researching information regarding the reason for and authorization for the original relocation of the plaque from Hastings and Renfrew to the Garden.

• HOP book tasks: chapter and introduction section revisions. New completion date is October, 2012.

August:

- Powell Street Festival August 4 and 5
- Hastings Park Fundraising project: GVJCCA Board portion of SPAM sushi sales was committed to fund the relocation of the Internment plague
- HRC has supported the Sale of UBC congregation graduate's yearbook as a fundraising source for the UBC Asian Canadian Studies program as well as the ongoing work of the GVJCCA HRC.
- Completion of HOP Blue Room Circle audio tape and HOP Compilation Tape copies to be given to Blue Room Circle story tellers. These story tellers will be given audio tapes of their stories due to the poor quality of the audio visual documentation of their circle.
- Committee members Vivian Regnestad, Lorene Oikawa, Judy Hanazawa agreed to write a response to the letter to the Bulletin forwarded by Tosh Suzuki. The letter and our response will be in the September edition. Tosh Suzuki criticizes the GVJCCA and the NAJC for being unsupportive of the work of Minister Yamamoto and the achievement of the Apology Motion. Our response emphasizes our criticism of the provincial government for not involving the community in the development of the Motion. We are also expressing appreciation for Tosh Suzuki's initiative and the Motion, while urging the government to begin working with the Japanese Canadian community toward planning a community event to bring the government apology to the people.
- Mary Kitagawa's letter to the premier will be copied to the NDP Opposition Leader
- August 27 HRC had meeting to review the status of the HOP book draft with our volunteer editor Randy Enomoto.

September:

- HRC meeting and final revisions of HOP book chapters scheduled for Saturday, September 8.
- Mid September: Hastings Park Steering Committee will be meeting with Hastings Park Redevelopment Steering Committee mid September
- Hastings Park Steering committee through the work of summer student Colin Brown, successfully completed a provincial grant



application due by August 31 to assist with costs of developing interpretive signage for the 4 remaining Hastings Park detention buildings.

Statement of the scholarship recipient, Sonia Singh:

I am a MES candidate at the Faculty of Environmental Studies at York University. In my major research paper, I will be examining the differential access to citizenship and labour and human rights protection created by temporary foreign worker programs in Canada. I will analyze organizing strategies and outcomes of advocacy campaigns for rights for migrant workers in several case studies through a collaborative research process with migrant workers and community advocates.

In my research, I am looking at how citizenship is both a site of inclusion and of exclusion (Hage, 2000). These themes have been explored in relation to the internment of 22,000 Japanese-Canadians during the 1940s. Oikawa (2002) writes that the "dispossession and discounting the citizenship of even those who were born in Canada, normalized their erasure from the B.C. coastal area (77)." Dhamoon and Abu-Laban (2009) describe how discourses of "foreignness" were tied to discourses of nation-building and security and were used to legitimize the forced removal of Japanese-Canadians (2009).

Exclusions to citizen rights continue to be justified through discourses of foreignness. Sharma (2006) describes how temporary foreign worker programs create a category of foreign noncitizen migrant workers who are excluded from rights enjoyed by Canadians. By limiting migrant workers' access to citizenship rights and labour mobility, these programs make workers access to labour and social protections extremely precarious (Sharma, 2006; Preibisch and Grez, 2010). The growth of temporary foreign worker programs is becoming a global phenomenon (Piper 2010) and Canada is increasingly relying on the use of temporary foreign worker programs to fill labour shortages (Basok, 2002; Sharma, 2006).

It is critical to examine how current immigration and labour policy are creating exclusionary practices which undermine access to human rights for an increasing percentage of the Canadian labour force. My research will support the objectives of the Canadian Japanese-Mennonite Scholarship through an analysis of how labour and human rights protections can be enhanced for migrant workers through community mobilization and migrant worker organizing.

An emerging literature documents the challenges and successes of organizing with immigrant workers through workers centres and community unionism initiatives (Fine, 2006; Ness, 2005; Milkman, 2000; Bronfenbrenner, 1998). However, an analysis of advocacy campaigns with temporary foreign workers is under-represented. Theorists who have examined this area have called for transnational organizing and networking across labour-community coalitions (Piper, 2010) and the formulation of "transnational labor citizenship" schemes (Gordon, 2011).

I will build on this literature by examining the strategies and outcomes of several human rights and labour rights advocacy campaigns with migrant workers participating in temporary foreign worker programs. Working collaboratively with migrant workers and community advocates, I will critically analyze what kinds of organizing strategies are needed to win improved labour and human rights protections for migrant workers in Canada.

Greater Toronto Chapter NAJC (Toronto) – Nikkei Manga Project

The Japanese Canadian Manga project is called, "Nikkei Manga-gatari". The managa book is approximately 100 pages, consisting of three illustrated and fully realized stories concerning each of the first three generations of the Japanese Canadians. The stories will be fully illustrated with sidebar descriptors of various events, customs and traditions of Nikkei culture and community. The goal of the book is to allow accessibility of Japanese Canadian history, community and culture for current and future generations of Japanese Canadians and



Canadians in general. Each story will illuminate the humanity of each Nikkei generation. The Issei story follows a Japanese Canadian soldier of World War I through his exploits before, during and after the battle of Vimy Ridge. The Nisei story looks at the lead-up to World War II and the internment experience. The Sansei story looks at a Sansei's discovery of his past and its implications for his life.

Japanese Canadian Cultural Centre (Toronto) - Keisho Conference

Funding is requested for the Keisho Conference which commemorates the 70th anniversary of the Japanese Canadian internment and dispersal. This will be a 1.5 day event open to the Japanese Canadian community and the broader community with the intention of providing opportunities to deepen their understanding of the Japanese Canadian history. The event includes a broad range of activities focused on actively engaging participants in exploring the life experience of those who were in internment camps, POW camps, farms and sugar beet farming, road camps, self-supporting communities, and Nisei veterans. Jeff Chiba Stearns (Burnaby) - Mixed Match

'Mixed Match' is an inspirational, emotional, and evocative feature length documentary that explores the need to find mixed ethnicity bone marrow and cord blood donors to donate to multi-ethnic patients suffering from the life threatening blood diseases such as leukemia. This is a live action and animated film and is a dramatic journey focusing on the main character's struggle to survive against incredible odds.

Seikyu Kai (Toronto) – Kyudo Equipment

Seikyu Kai was founded in 2008. The second phase, for which money is being sought, will continue gathering stories from different parts of Canada. The goal is to have a final written draft and public reading and a performance.
