









HEALING SUPPORT FOR JAPANESE CANADIANS

The Anglican Church of Canada and the National Association of Japanese Canadians are pleased to announce that an agreement in principle has been reached to provide healing support to Japanese Canadians affected by the actions of Mr. G. G. Nakayama. Mr. Nakayama is known to have sexually abused hundreds of Japanese Canadian boys during his time as an Anglican priest from 1934 to 1994.

The Anglican Church of Canada has authorized the sum of \$610,000 to contribute to a Healing Fund for Japanese Canadians, to be administered by the National Association of Japanese Canadians. The Anglican Church has also agreed to finance the costs of a Facilitator/Project Manager, to be jointly selected by the Church and by the National Association of Japanese Canadians to lead a project team that is being formed to deliver the healing support. The Fund will be used to provide therapeutic counselling, educational grants, healing gatherings and community education, primarily for the remaining survivors of the clergy sexual abuse, the families and descendant families of persons harmed by Mr. Nakayama, and other members of the community affected by Mr. Nakayama's actions. Additional sums may be contributed to the Healing Fund in future.

This support follows up on a public apology made by the Anglican Church of Canada to the Japanese Canadian community in June 2015. In its apology and in recently authorizing the healing funds, the Anglican Church reaffirmed its commitment to participate in a healing and reconciliation process with the members of the Japanese Canadian community that were harmed by Mr. Nakayama.

NAJC PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE – MARCH 2021

75 years ago, Japanese Canadians received a decision on a legal challenge that went all the way to the Privy Council in the United Kingdom. In the case of the government's exile orders to force Canadians of Japanese ethnicity to Japan, Privy Council sided with Parliament. In the *New Canadian* newspaper, the response was unyielding, "We must continue the fight because we believe in the justice of our cause, and because we firmly believe that there is in Canada a thing called democracy."

Unchecked, the government stripped Japanese Canadians of their rights and freedoms. Almost 80 years ago, the massive uprooting of Japanese Canadians started on February 26, 1942. Some were only given 24 hours' notice. On March 4, 1942, JCs were ordered to turn over all property and belongings to the Custodian of Enemy Alien Property. Order-in-Council P.C. 1665 was passed and this legislated theft was called a protective measure. On March 16, 1942, the first of the nearly 8,000 Japanese Canadians arrived at Hastings Park in Vancouver. They are held there, sometimes for months like the maternal side of my family, before being shipped further. Further injustices would continue and it wasn't until 1949, four years after World War II ended, that Japanese Canadians could return to the west coast of BC. But everything was taken away from them and there were no homes to return to.

In the midst of this timeline review, let us remember March 21 is the International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination. The origin of this day is when 69 people were killed by the police at a peaceful demonstration against apartheid "pass laws" in 1960 in Sharpeville, South Africa. A different community under attack, but motivated by hate for people based on their ethnicity. Unfortunately, the hate hasn't gone away. We have seen hate incidents explode during the pandemic. The Vancouver Police Department reported a 97% increase in hate incidents and a 717% increase in anti-Asian hate incidents from 2019 to 2020. The hate manifests in the rhetoric of white supremacists and their

groups, in the long-established systemic racism in society, and targeted attacks against Indigenous, and racialized individuals and organizations.

There isn't a simple answer to eliminate racial discrimination. It takes all of us, individuals, groups, organizations, businesses, unions, schools, media, and government to take action. One important piece is education, sharing of our stories, and building inclusivity. Too often, Indigenous stories including precolonial ones and racialized stories are not a part of Canadian history. We are seen as the "others" and not belonging. Being a Yonsei, fourth generation Canadian, doesn't prevent me from being questioned, "Where are you really from?"

The NAJC continues our work including sharing stories and having important discussions through our online programming which has greatly expanded since the pandemic. Besides featuring talented members of our Japanese Canadian community in events, we also support the development of creative works, projects, and individuals. One of the ways we provide support is through the NAJC Endowment Fund. The purpose of the NAJC Endowment Fund is to enhance the development of the Japanese Canadian community. There is funding available under two programs, Cultural Development and Sports, Education, and Arts Development. The deadline for applications is June 30, 2021. Eligibility and application information is on the NAJC website. http://najc.ca/funds-and-awards/ A question & answer session for potential applicants will be set up this month and we will provide a Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) resource.

Some of you may remember my work with the City of Surrey and the Discovering the Stories of Japanese Canadians in Surrey event. I am excited to let you know that the Surrey Heritage Interpretation Program is planning on installing a new heritage marker in Bear Creek Park, located in the Newton neighbourhood of Surrey. Surrey is a city within the Metro Vancouver



area. The marker will take the form of a regional map with family names printed on their historical property lots – a snapshot of residents of the area in 1940.

They have been reviewing archival resources, but it's important that we review the information to ensure the Japanese Canadian names on the heritage marker are accurate and complete. Surrey Heritage is looking for any assistance to confirm and correct the information. They would also be interested in anyone who may have stories or any other information to share. Their list of names includes Hirasawa, Mijazaki, Ota, Shinmoto, Shinohara, Hori, Inouye, Kawazoi, Ono, Yasui, Imahashi, Nakamura, Minto, Shigeta, Hashida, Kimura, Morioka, Okazaki, Nishioka, Fukushima, and Hinatsu. The associated addresses and map are posted on the NAJC website http://najc.ca/japanese-canadian-residents-in-1940-surrey/ Please provide your feedback as soon as possible, because the signage is being planned for early summer 2021. Thank you for your help.

NAJC 会長のメッセージ 2021 年 3 月 ロリン・オイカワ

75年前、日系カナダ人は、連邦政府に対して起こした訴訟の最終判決を、英国枢密院から受け取りました。この訴訟は、連邦政府が日本人を祖先に持つカナダ人を、日本に追放しようとした政策に関するものでした。英国枢密院は、日系カナダ人の日本への追放を、合法的だと認めました。この判決に対する「ニューカナディアン紙」の反応は、次のように揺るぎのないものでした。「我々は、我々の主張が正義だと信じるので、戦いを止めない。カナダには民主主義があると信じる。」

誰も止める者のいなくなった連邦政府は、日系カナ ダ人の人権と自由を剥奪しました。約80年前の 1942年2月26日に、日系カナダ人の大規模な強制 移動が始まりました。中には、たった 24 時間の猶 予しか与えられずに、自分の家を追い出された人た ちもいました。1942年3月4日に、日系カナダ人 は、全ての資産と個人的な持ち物を、「敵性外国人 資産管理人」に提出することを命令されました。こ の命令は連邦政府内閣令 1665 号によるもので、合 法化された窃盗にほかなりませんが、政府は日系カ ナダ人の資産を保護するためだと、強弁しました。 そして、1942年3月16日に自宅から追い出された 日系人の第一団の8,000人余りが、バンクーバーの ヘイスティングス・パークに到着しました。そし て、収容所に移動するまで、何ヶ月もここに閉じ込 められていました。私の母方の一家もここにいまし た。日系カナダは、これ以降も様々な不正義を、政 府から受けました。日系カナダ人が BC 州の太平洋 沿岸に戻れたのは、第二次世界大戦が終結してから 4年目の

1949年でした。しかし、そこには、もう自分の家は、政府に売り払われてしまっていて、残ってい。



このように3月は、日系カナダ人にとって重要な月で す。3月にはもう一つ、忘れてはならない日がありま す。3月21日は「世界人種差別根絶の日」です。 1960年のこの日に、南アフリカのシャープビルで、 アパルトハイト政策に反対する平和的なデモの参加者 が69名、警官によって殺されました。カナダから遠 く離れたところで、人種差別によるヘイトで起きた事 件でした。ヘイトは現在も横行しています。COVID-19 パンデミック下で、ヘイト事件は増加しています。バ ンクーバー警察によれば、2019年から2020年にかけ て、ヘイト事件は97パーセント増加し、アジア系カ ナダ人に対するヘイト事件は717パーセント増加しま した。ヘイトは白人至上主義者とその仲間の言動や、 社会の中に長年根付いている制度的な人種差別によっ て醸成され、カナダ先住民、人種的少数派に属する個 人や団体を目標にしています。

人種差別を根絶する簡単な方法はありません。私たちは、個人、グループ、団体、企業、労働組合、学校、メディア、政府、として努力を続けなければなりません。この努力に大切な要素が一つあります。教育です。教育を通して、我々の経験を皆に伝え、皆の一体感を増強していくことが大切です。白人の入植前も含めたカナダ先住民の経験や、少数派カナダ人の経験は、いまだカナダの歴史の一部になっていません。私たちは、カナダの歴史の一部でない「他の人たち」と見なされているのです。私は4世ですが、未だに「あなたは、本当はどの国の人なの?」と質問されます。

NAJC は人種差別根絶に向かった活動を続けていきます。日系カナダ人の経験を皆と共有し、オンライの討論会を開きます。NAJC はオンラインの討論会を、COVID-19 パンデミック以来、拡充してきました。また皆で集まれるまで、オンラインで会いましょう。オンライン会合の情報は http://najc.ca/online-

The LOI digital archive collections are the culmination of a four-year intensive research period conducted by project members. It includes a diverse array of materials from archival and government records to oral histories as well as land title records and transcribed directories. This archive boasts a total of 32,042 html documents collected from over 20 archives and repositories from Canada, US and UK. The documents include over 10,000 case files from the Office of the Custodian, over 1,400 files related to the Bird Commission, 7,397 land title documents, 1,019 Fishing Boat Ledger files, 454 protest letter documents, 139 oral histories and more.

NAJC STATEMENT ON ANTI-ASIAN HATE

The National Executive Board of the National Association of Japanese Canadians (NAJC) has heard from our members and member organizations across Canada who are shaken by the ongoing incidents of anti-Asian hate. We expressed our solidarity with Asian Americans who were reeling with the news of the six Asian American women who were killed in Atlanta. Whether in the news, social media, or by personal account, the incidents are increasing on both sides of the border.

We asked our JC members to report any incidents. One of our Japanese Canadian elders, a sansei (third generation Canadian of Japanese ancestry) told us she was walking outside when she was verbally attacked and told that she is the cause of the virus and "to go back where she came from." The elder said it brought back horrible memories of the internment. Other JCs have also reported similar attacks.

There is an upsurge in the attacks against Asian Americans and Asian Canadians which started at the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic. Asian Canadians, Asian Americans, and anyone who looks Asian are being attacked and unfairly blamed for the pandemic.

The Vancouver Police Department reported an over 700% increase in the number of anti-Asian hate incidents in 2020. There needs to be more race-based data collection to support changes in policy and legislation. Filling the gap for now, community groups have started documenting the incidents. What we do know is that there are more cases of anti-Asian hate then what is reported to the police. We also see that women are disproportionately the target of the hate.

We need to emphasize Anti-Asian racism is not new. Historical accounts often lack the stories of racialized settlers and Indigenous peoples. If more people understood the injustice of the past, maybe we wouldn't keep repeating the mistakes. Anti-Asian racism started when Asian settlers first came to Canada.

Our Japanese Canadian ancestors experienced anti-Asian racism when they arrived as settlers in the 1800s. They and Chinese Canadians experienced it in the anti-Asian riot that took place in 1907 in downtown Vancouver, a planned event organized by both Americans and Canadians. Anti-Asian racism persisted and manifested in the injustice against Japanese Canadians during the Second World War. In 1942 nearly 22,000 Canadians of Japanese ethnicity were forcibly uprooted, dispossessed, interned until four years after the war ended, and exiled.

Other Asian Canadians have their own stories to tell. There is diversity within Asian communities. Our communities comprise newcomers and multigenerational families. We're not all the same, but unfortunately we do have the experience of anti-Asian racism in common.

More work needs to be done to stop the stereotypes, the marginalization of racialized people, and the "othering" of people through comments, questions, jokes, and racial slurs. These attacks take place in person and are increasing online. We need to set up processes and policies to prevent the toxic environments where bullies thrive.

The NAJC is committed to our human rights work including education and creating safe spaces where we can share our stories and build inclusivity. We are working with our community, other community groups, other organizations, and all levels of government.

This will take the effort of all of us, individually and collectively, to stop the anti-Asian hate and all forms of racism. Doing nothing is not an option.



TORONTO NAJC STATEMENT ON ANTI-ASIAN VIOLENCE ACROSS NORTH AMERICA. Statement issued by the Toronto NAJC

TORONTO, ON (March 17, 2021)

The NAJC condemns the acts of violence that took the lives of eight people including six Asian women in Atlanta. We mourn their loss. Our hearts and minds are with their family, friends, and communities.

"Whether these murders were intended to target the victims because of their work, gender, or their Asian ethnicity, they come at a time when our community is already feeling exposed and vulnerable. The impacts of the discrimination and outright racism that have been brought to the forefront by the Covid-19 pandemic have continued to wear us down, and while the motives behind this most recent attack still remain unknown, the implications are harrowing." (Japanese American Citizens League Statement on March 16th attack in Atlanta)

Since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic, Anti-Asian racism and violence has increased across North America. Japanese Canadians see historic parallels between the viral nature of the current rise and escalation of racism and hate – to that which saw our community dispossessed and exiled from British Columbia in the 1940's.

In 1905 the Asiatic Exclusion League (AEL) formed in the United States to target Japanese and Korean Americans and grew to include all Asians. A chapter was formed in Vancouver in 1907 and less than a month later the 1907 Vancouver Anti-Asian Riots erupted, lasting three days. Mobs of up to 8,000 marched through Chinatown and Powell Street vandalizing businesses and assaulting Asians with the Chinese community enduring the brunt of the

devastation and aggression.

We call on our political leaders to continue to fight racism on all fronts, and for all peoples. This tsunami of anti-Asian racism in Canada is interconnected with all forms of racism and discrimination – fueled by home grown white supremacists and nurtured historically with 170 pieces of discriminatory anti-Asian legislation in the Province of British Columbia. We call upon all Canadians to speak out and act against racism and hatred – support legislation that outlaws' white supremacists and measures that give substance to addressing hate crimes and hate speech in Canada. STATEMENT FROM CRRF ON INCREASE OF ANTI-ASIAN VIOLENCE ACROSS NORTH AMERICA

The Canadian Race Relations Foundation (CRRF) is deeply concerned with the increasing levels of violence perpetrated against Canada's Asian population since the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic. The violence against Asian-Canadians harkens back to an extremely dark period in Canada's history where Asians were targets of racism during a period of crisis. The present-day events put this country on a dangerous trajectory that it cannot afford to repeat.

Yesterday's shooting of eight innocent women in Atlanta should be a wake-up call to all Canadians with compassion and reason that this escalation of physical and emotional violence must come to an end immediately. The wanton act of violence expressed in Atlanta yesterday evening is not exclusive to the US. In Vancouver alone, there has been a reported 878 percent increase in violence committed against Asians, and in Montreal, the police have registered a 16 percent increase in violence against the Asian community.



According to a joint report from Fight COVID Racism and Elimin8Hate.org, 60 percent of the victims of anti-Asian racism incidents have been women since the beginning of the pandemic. Thirty percent of incidents reported are physically violent.

"A pandemic that does not discriminate when it chooses its victims should never be the catalyst for anyone to enact racial discrimination," states CRRF Board Chair Teresa Woo-Paw. "In a time of crisis, we should be banding together to denounce racism and hold those who enact it to account whenever and wherever possible."

The CRRF is calling on all Canadians to:

Report all incidents of anti-Asian violence to the authorities

Provide safe spaces: Allow Asian-Canadian friends and colleagues to share their experiences and listen to what they have to say

Educate yourself and others: The most effective way to eliminate racism in all its forms is to educate yourself and those around you about other racialized people, their cultures, and how racism manifests itself.

"CRRF stands in solidarity will the 6.1 million Asian-Canadians across the country—many of whom have had to live in fear for their safety over the last year," said Woo-Paw. "Asian-Canadians, and every Canadian for that matter, deserve better, and we must do our utmost to ensure that we root out the cancer of hate from this great country."

ASIAN CANADIAN WOMEN'S ALLIANCE STATEMENT ON ATLANTA SHOOTINGS

ACWA extends our condolences to the victims' families. The authorities have identified those killed in the attacks as Employees Soon Chung Park, 74; Suncha Kim, 69; Yong Ae Yue, 63; Hyun Jung Grant, 51; Xiaojie Tan, 49; Daoyou Feng, 44; Patrons, Delaina Ashley Yaun, 33 and Paul Andre Michels, 54

Toronto-based Asian Canadian Women's Alliance (ACWA) condemns the murders of eight people in Atlanta, including six Asian women. ACWA considers the shooting rampage a direct result of the former president's racist comments during the Covid pandemic. Anti-Asian hate crimes have spiked in Canada at a higher per capita rate than the US. In Vancouver, such incidents nearly doubled in 2020 over 2019. Women, the elderly, and the most marginalized segments of the community are disproportionately targeted, according to a September 2020 report conducted by the Chinese Canadian National Council, Toronto Chapter and Project 1907, Vancouver. ACWA extends our condolences to the victims' families. We urge Canadian authorities to be vigilant about the continuing violence against Asian Canadians.

The 16 founding members of ACWA include Joy Kogawa, Lynn Deutscher Kobayashi, Maryka Omatsu, Julia Shin-Doi and Pamela Sugiman.

The City of Surrey Heritage Project needs assistance with names of former Japanese Canadian residents in 1940.

#BlockHate CAMPAIGN HIGHLIGHTS THE CONSEQUENCES OF ONLINE HATE

The Canadian Race Relations Foundation and YWCA Canada launch an awareness campaign highlighting the stories of young Canadian women who have survived misogyny and racism online

TORONTO, March 22, 2021—The Canadian Race Relations Foundation (CRRF) and YWCA Canada have launched a social media campaign called #BlockHate to address concerns around the rise of hate speech and racism online. The campaign launch coincides with the International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination on March 21. The campaign features women of colour targeted by online hate through social media who share their experiences.

Online hate speech and racism are often a precursor to the unfortunate trend of violent, in-person attacks against marginalized communities. This is evidenced in the hate speech spread online about Asians over the course of the COVID-19 pandemic followed by an over 700 percent rise in violent attacks Asian-Canadians in cities like Vancouver. This was also true when 60 percent of Canadians indicated in an Ipsos Reid poll that Islamophobia was increasing post-9/11.

Noor Fadel, featured in the #BlockHate campaign, was 18-years-old when she was attacked on a train four years ago by a stranger for wearing a hijab. When she posted her story to social media, it went viral. She received many supportive messages and received hundreds of sexist, racist, and Islamophobic comments concerning her experience.

"During the pandemic, we've seen all forms of gender-based violence increase including online hate. Young, racialized women, are particularly vulnerable," said YWCA Canada CEO Maya Roy. "Not investing in measures to prevent, address and report hate online hurts us all. We can't have any COVID-19 recovery in a climate of hate, violence, and fear."

Young people are some of the most deeply affected by online hate speech. A recent poll conducted by CRRF and Abacus Data indicated that young people between 18 and 29 are the most avid social media users. Yet, they are more likely than any other age demographic in the country to have directly received or witnessed offensive name-calling, racist, sexist, homophobic comments, incitements of violence, sexual harassment, and physical threats online. Racialized Canadians are three times more likely to experience online hate speech.

Ninety-three percent of Canadians believe that online hate speech and racism are a problem. Eighty percent want online hate speech and racism treated with the same seriousness as in-person hate crimes by lawmakers. Despite the overwhelming support for regulation, law enforcement around racism and hate speech perpetrated online has been uneven. Nonetheless, well-established laws penalizing those who enact in-person hate crimes are more regularly enforced.

"What we are hoping to accomplish is to encourage regulation that will minimize the volume and frequency at which online hate speech and racism is spread," said CRRF Executive Director Mohammed Hashim. "This campaign is an effort to ensure that the hateful fringe voices are never given the greatest platforms."
